

# Research study seeking volunteers

## *Help-Seeking Behavior in Stem Cell and Bone Marrow Transplant Patients*

***Have you received a bone marrow or stem cell transplant? Did you cope well with your transplant, or did you get distressed, anxious, or depressed?***

Either way, you may qualify for a study by the Behavioral Medicine Research team at Eastern Michigan University. The researchers hope to better understand whether adult bone marrow or stem cell transplant survivors feel a need for help from mental health professionals, where they turn to for help, and how beneficial that help is.

*Persons over the age of 18 years who have had a bone marrow or stem cell transplant are encouraged to participate by completing an on-line 30 minute survey. The questions are about current and past emotional well-being and mental health treatment, attitudes to seeking professional help, and social support.*



The results of this study may benefit other survivors and their caregivers, because their medical and mental health care providers may use the information to develop more effective treatments for bone marrow or stem cell transplant survivors. To find out more about the study, please click here:
